Supplementing our letter of March 11, 1983, following is a statement of A T & T's patent position with respect to Proposed Standard BSR X3.110, if adopted as an ANSI Standard, and ANSI's patent policy:

Upon request, A T & T will grant non-exclusive, royalty-free licenses under its PATENTS to make, have made, and use equipment solely to the extent necessary to implement the STANDARD, but on condition that the requestor grants to A T & T, for itself and its subsidiaries, royalty-free licenses of the same scope under the requestor's PATENTS.

As used herein:

PATENTS means issued patents or patents resulting from invention made, owned or controlled by the granter (A T & T or the requestor) or its subsidiaries; provided, however, that in no event will any licenses granted include licenses under any patent the use of which is not essential to implementing the STANDARD or which can be avoided by those skilled in the art through the exercise of their best efforts.

STANDARD means ANSI Standard X3.110-1983, if adopted essentially as published for comment in January, 1983, as Proposed Standard BSR X3.110.

If requested, A T & T will consider alternative licensing arrangements on reasonable terms and conditions.
